

About the MacLean Center Seminar Series

In 1981, under the auspices of the MacLean Center, Mark Siegler and Richard Epstein organized a yearlong multidisciplinary seminar series on *Bad Outcomes after Medical Innovation*. The success of that initial seminar program suggested that there was interest at the University of Chicago in creating a forum to discuss health-related subjects with colleagues from across campus. For 29 consecutive years, the MacLean Center has sponsored annual interdisciplinary seminar series on topics such as health reform, pediatric ethics, controversies in end of life care, and global health. In the academic year 2010–11, the Center will sponsor 29 seminars on the topic: *Health Disparities: Local, National, Global*.

Health Disparities

New interdisciplinary efforts to target health disparities have recognized that health care and health status are essential for human functioning and well-being. Disparities in health and health care at the local level in Chicago, as well as at national and global levels, increasingly are viewed as not only social and political challenges but as ethical problems as well. Preventable deaths and disabilities—whether from treatable infectious diseases in Africa or from infant and maternal mortality in Chicago—demand engagement from the bioethics as well as the political communities.

This year's interdisciplinary seminar series on health disparities is cosponsored by the MacLean Center for Clinical Medical Ethics (Director: Mark Siegler, MD), the Urban Health Initiative (Director: Eric Whitaker, MD, MPH), the Global Health Initiative (Director: Olufunmilayo Olopade, MD), and The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Program *Finding Answers: Disparities Research for Change* (Director: Marshall Chin, MD). The program organizers hope that these interdisciplinary seminar discussions will help the University of Chicago community to promote a goal we all share: to reduce health care disparities in Chicago, throughout the United States, and globally.
