James B. McAuley, MD, MPH, DTM&H, MDiv

Dr. McAuley is an internist and pediatrician as well as an adult and pediatric infectious disease specialist. He re-joined CDC in July 2011 as a medical officer to support further integration of program and clinical activities in PEPFAR Zambia. Prior to being named the CDC Zambia Country Director in 2014, he led CDC Zambia's efforts in two major Public-Private initiatives – Saving Mothers Giving Life, and Pink Ribbon Red Ribbon. His previous experience has included four years with the CDC; first as an Epidemic Intelligence Service Officer in parasitology, then as a TB Medical Officer assigned to Chicago. He has directed TB and HIV clinical programs as well as NIH supported research activities. He has served as the Medical Director of the Cook County Jail and as the Director of Pediatric Infectious Diseases and Program Director for the Combined Internal Medicine/Pediatrics Residency Program at Rush University in Chicago, where he maintains an appointment as Professor of Internal Medicine and Pediatrics. He received his BS, MPH, and MD from Northwestern University, and completed residency and fellowship training at the University of Chicago. His Diploma in Tropical Medicine and Hygiene is from the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine. Dr.

McAuley has published over 100 scientific manuscripts, abstracts, and book chapters related to HIV, TB, parasitology, and general infectious diseases. He has served on the US Department of Health and Human Services Pediatric HIV Treatment Guidelines Committee since 2008.

He has worked on several short term projects in Bolivia, Malawi, and Rwanda. He is an ordained Presbyterian minister and while in Zambia 2011-16 he taught *HIV and the Pastor* at Justo Mwale Theological Seminary. In addition, he provided care for patients and taught Infectious Disease trainees in the MMed program at the University Teaching Hospital in Lusaka Zambia.

Dr. McAuley twice served in Sierra Leone 2014-15 as the CDC Team Lead where he helped direct 60-100 CDC workers as they sought to contain the Ebola epidemic.

Upon returning from Sierra Leone in June 2015 he reached a new high, when he and his sons summited Mt. Kilimanjaro – 19,341 feet.

In 2016 he received the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Global AIDS Program Kellie Elizabeth Lartigue-Ndiaye Humanitarian Award for exceptional compassion in carrying out the Global AIDS Program mission and in October 2016 was in Chicago to receive the Children's Place International *Place the Hope Honoree* for his work with vulnerable populations during the Sierra Leone Ebola crisis.

He is married to Amy, also an internist/pediatrician with an MPH who worked at Lawndale Christian Health Center for 19 years. They have four children – Miriam (29), Ruth (26), and John (24) and Christopher (21).

After 5 years of service in Zambia as the CDC Country Director Jim left CDC in May 2016 and joined the US Indian Health Service. The transition allows Jim and Amy to be closer to family in the US and to continue serving amongst underserved populations. Jim is the Clinical Director of the Whiteriver Indian Hospital which serves the White Mountain Apache Tribe on the Fort Apache Reservation in Arizona. Amy also works for the Indian Health Service and provides primary care to residents of Cibecue, Arizona.
